



United States History is from Early America and the Federalist Era, through Westward Expansion and Manifest Destiny, to Sectionalism and Antebellum America leading to the Civil War and finally Reconstruction

Grading: The purpose of grading is to accurately communicate what each student knows, understands, and can apply.

Rules and Expectations:

Homework and Makeup Work:

<u>Homework:</u> I don't usually assign homework. If assignments are sent home, it may be to complete something that was not done in class, to study for a test or to preview a reading to be prepared for the next class period.

<u>Makeup Work</u>: Work will be accepted during the quarter but will receive a reduced grade of up to 70% of the original score. Please do your best to complete assignments on time. Please refer to the <u>school handbook</u> for more information regarding makeup work when sick or attending a sporting event. The main thing I ask is to be open and communicate with me when your child will not be in school, even if it is for a school event. As the year goes on, I encourage your child to be the one to email me when needed.
