We also welcomed Norah Barney of School Services of Montana to work with our teaching staff on beginning the proficiency-based education process. Proficiency-based education is a concept that has been introduced previously; it has existed since the 1980s. However, it has gained national attention and is being implemented in the public education system in all 50 states. Montana recently passed legislation requiring schools to progress toward a proficiency-based educational model.

This is a very large topic, and this write-up will not nearly sufficiently detail its complexities. That being said, it is a relatively easy concept to understand. The basic premise requires teachers to prioritize the standards within their curriculum and build assessments where the students can demonstrate proficiency in that class's essential skills and knowledge. All of our teachers already utilize this model in various ways, and the District will continue to plan and discuss as we move closer to a proficiency-based model that fits our particular needs. We are moving towards a proficiency-based educational model, but it will take years to move over fully.
